## **Diana & Roxy Fund**



The Diana & Roxy Fund was started at the request of SVHS supporter Diana Fiori, in memory of her dog, Roxy. Diana wanted the funds to help cover veterinary care in extraordinary circumstances. The fund has aided dozens of pets.

Funds from the Diana & Roxy Fund were used when a Good Samaritan rescued a stray cat that was pregnant. The mom cat and her kittens (pictured above) received veterinary care and all were spay/neutered before new homes were found by a local rescue group.

- \* Myah, a dog treated for Parvovirus
- \* Barry, a rescued dog needed an exam and neuter
- \* Oliver, a cat with a urinary tract blockage needed tests and surgery
- \* Coco, a Chihuahua suffering seizures


many of you know, we are not affiliated with either the Humane Society of the United States or the ASPCA and do not receive funding from either source; we rely entirely upon your generosity.

Every day, SVHS volunteers respond to a variety of phone calls and emails, the majority being pleas for financial assistance for pets in need of veterinary care. Often the calls involve strays rescued by good Samaritans or come from guardians with a limited income, veterans or homeless persons. Each situation is assessed carefully and if appropriate, a pledge is made for the pet at the client's vet office. Fortunately, there are numerous veterinarians who are willing to accept our pledges despite it being additional work for them. Once the pet's treatment is completed and we've received an invoice, a check is issued to the veterinary practice requesting that the funds be applied to the client's account. It's quite a process involving a series of phone calls but the outcome is so rewarding for all concerned.

Many, many thanks to the donors, veterinarians, their staffs and the SVHS volunteers for their contributions. They are an exceptionally special group of caring individuals who have enabled so many companion animals to receive much needed treatment.

## Holiday Hazards

It's tempting to share holiday foods with our furry friends, but the foods that humans love may cause



gastric upset or worse in cats and dogs. Seek veterinary care immediately if your pet is vomiting and/or has diarrhea and you suspect non-pet foods were ingested.

The high fat content in **poultry skin**, **fatty or fried foods** may cause pancreatitis in dogs (inflammation of the pancreas) , which requires immediate vet care. Even small amounts of **grapes or raisins** may cause kidney failure in dogs. **Chocolate** contains the obromine and may be fatal. **Unsweetened baking chocolate** contains the highest levels of this chemical.

Raw bones, may contain harmful bacteria and cooked bones splinter easily and may cause intestinal perforation. Liquor can be fatal and coffee/tea may cause damage to the digestive, urinary or nervous system. Cookies, cake or any baked goods can cause gastric upset. Anything sweetened with Xylitol is highly toxic to dogs.

- Keep food gifts out of reach and not under the tree.
- Some holiday flowers and plants are toxic to pets:
   Poinsettia and holly can cause irritation to a pet's mouth, decreased appetite or vomiting. Mistletoe, even in small amounts, may cause gastric irritation that may be severe.
- Water additives placed in the Christmas tree stand may develop bacteria that is harmful if ingested.
- Chewing on electrical cords may cause burns, or even death by electrocution. Unplug tree lights when you are not home, use pet-safe cords or treat cords with a deterrent spray.
- Keep antifreeze out of reach and clean up droppings immediately and completely. Antifreeze is highly toxic and dogs especially are attracted to its scent.
- Tinsel, Trees & Lights: Keep fallen
  decorations picked-up. Swallowing tinsel can
  cause choking or internal obstructions; broken
  ornaments can cut delicate paws.

These hazards represent a partial list of items harmful to pets. Ask your vet for more information.

At the end of each medical aid recipient listed, a **Pledge** or **Vet Grant** dollar amount is noted. The SVHS offers a

Veterinary Grant Program that provides \$500 to each of the first 15 area vets who register annually. Program vets may use the grant, at their discretion, to help one pet or several. Requests for Vet Grant funds are made by the vets on behalf of their clients. Conversely,



Pledges are offered to individuals who call our Helpline asking for financial aid. Like Vet Grants, Pledges are paid directly to veterinarians, not as a reimbursement to individuals.
