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
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

President's Message

Dear readers,

Looking back some 25 years or more, I recall being so jubilant upon hearing that animals from shelters and rescue groups would have to be spayed or neutered before being placed into new adoptive homes. At the time, I was convinced that by following this mandate,

fewer and fewer animals would be born, thus reducing the numbers of unwanted animals in shelters and with rescue groups and that the euthanasia rates would therefore drop to a bare minimum. How wrong I was! It appears that the numbers of pets waiting for new homes has not decreased considerably nor has the euthanasia rate been dramatically reduced.

But the SVHS won't be deterred. We will continue to offer financial aid to those seeking spay and neuter services through regular veterinary offices, but, having partnered with a mobile veterinary quite recently who offers spay & neuter and vaccination clinics throughout the Orange County area, we can increase our efforts.

Whilst it may not be possible to eliminate pet homelessness, we intend to keep their numbers down to a minimum, and, by spaying and neutering them we are helping to achieve that goal. Also, there are considerable benefits for each animal. Sterilization in females prevents the risk of mammary gland tumors and ovarian and intestinal cancer and in males, testicular and prostate cancer and hernias are avoided. Pets are less likely to roam, fight or spray which is a bonus for all pet guardians too.

It's certainly a daunting task but I feel an essential one. I hope you too feel this area of our work is important and that we can count on your support as we continue to aim for a situation with no more homeless pets. Kindest regards, *Vivien Frankland*

From A Facebook Posting

A SVHS board member saw a Facebook post warning that an area breeder sold a puppy infected with the Parvo virus (see sidebar.) The posting mentioned that the pup was being treated at a veterinary practice that the SVHS

works with frequently. The pup was hospitalized and the cost of care had already reached several thousand dollars with additional costs pending.

The board member contacted the vet office and learned that the pup's name is Myah and she is a 13-week-old Golden Doodle. The pup's guardian suffers from PTSD and Myah was supposed to be a support animal. The pup's severe illness, however, has caused the guardian extreme anxiety. Myah was in isolation at the vet's office and fortunately was improving, but was being handfed because she could not yet eat on her own. Even when Myah is able to go home, she will need massive doses of antibiotics and continued vet monitoring.

The vet gave the guardians instructions to thoroughly clean their home with bleach and,

because Parvovirus can live in an environment for long periods of time, they were instructed not to allow any dog on their property for the period of one year. Given the circumstances, our board member felt compelled to offer a pledge.

Pledge \$250 from the SVHS's Diana & Roxy Fund, an emergency care fund established by SVHS supporter Diana Fiori.

> What's the difference between a Pledge and a Vet Grant?

At the end of each medical aid recipient listed, a Pledge or Vet Grant dollar amount is noted. The SVHS offers a Veterinary Grant Program that provides \$500 to each of the first 15 area vets who register annually. Program vets may use the grant, at their discretion, to help one pet or several. Requests for Vet Grant funds are made by the vets on behalf of their clients. Conversely, Pledges are



offered to individuals who call our Helpline asking for financial aid. Like Vet Grants, Pledges are paid directly to veterinarians, not as a reimbursement to individuals.

Canine parvovirus affects dogs' gastrointestinal tract and is spread by direct dog-to-dog contact or contact with contaminated environments, including, but not limited to kennel surfaces, feces, turf, food and water bowls, collars and leashes and the hands and clothing of people who have handled infected dogs. The virus is highly contagious and can survive in an environment for long periods of time.


Signs of parvovirus include lethargy, loss of appetite, abdominal pain and bloating, fever or low body temperature, vomiting and severe, often bloody, diarrhea. Persistent vomiting and diarrhea can cause rapid dehydration and damage to intestine and the immune system that can result in septic shock. No specific drug is available that will kill the virus. Treatment is intended to support the dogs' body systems until the immune system can fight off the viral infection.

Vaccination and good hygiene are critical for prevention. Prior to getting a puppy speak with you vet about vaccinations. To protect adult dogs, the parvovirus vaccination must be kept up-to-date.

Toby, developed a urinary tract blockage. When several attempts by the vet to clear the blockage failed, the cat needed emergency Perineal Urethrostomy (or PU) surgery to save his life. This surgery can decrease the likelihood of recurring obstruction. Pledge \$275

Leche, an English Bulldog had cherry eye, entropion in both eyes and allergies. Entropion is a genetic condition in which a portion of the eyelid is inverted, causing an eyelash or hair to irritate and scratch the eye surface, leading to corneal ulceration or perforation. Pledge \$200

Soup, a cat needed surgery to removed a severely infected eye. Pledge \$200

Princess, a dog had a tooth abscess. Pledae \$200

Sneakers, a dog needed X-rays. The dog's guardian was homeless and now in permanent housing. Pledge \$200

Raku, a cat was not eating, drinking, had a high fever, drooling, ulcers on her tongue. The vet suspected a virus, but it was determined to be an accidental poisoning. Pledge \$250



Summer Sun Safety Reminders

Don't take your dog with you to run errands in the car. Extreme heat

builds quickly inside a parked car that can kill a dog in minutes — and, that's with the windows opens and the car parked in the shade.

- Walk your dog during the cooler morning and evening hours. Hot pavement can burn delicate paw pads. If the sidewalk or asphalt is too hot for your bare feet, it's too hot for your dog's paws.
- Don't shave or close cut your dog's fur. Instead, brush to remove excess fur, which helps keep him cool. A dog's exposed skin sunburns easily. Fur protects from sun, heat, insect bites, and helps retain water after a romp with the garden hose.
- Keep a supply of cool, clean water in a spill-proof bowl available at all times. Some dogs enjoy a water filled wading pool to lie in when temperatures rise.
